UTAH TERRITORIAL MAILS

The population of Utah neared 5,000 at the close of 1849 and new settlements, under the skilled organization of Brigham Young, mushroomed throughout the territory. First of the new settlements was Bountiful, ten miles north of Salt Lake City, which was settled in September of 1847. Following Bountiful and in the order listed, Farmington, Kaysville, Centerville, Holladay's Settlement (later Big Cottonwood), Mill Creek, Sugar House, South Cottonwood, and Draper were settled. All of these settlements were close to the mother town of Salt Lake City.

The second Utah valley to be colonized was Weber. The first settlement, Brownsville (later to become Ogden) was followed closely by North Ogden and East Weber. At the close of 1852 a considerable number of small settlements existed throughout the area, 18 of these were served by post offices: Salt Lake City, Brownsville, Miller's Creek, Corn Creek, American Fork, Springville, Utah Lake, Payson, Salt Creek, Fillmore City, Centre Creek, Carson Valley, Manti, Palmyra, Pleasant Grove, Star City, Parowan and Tooele City.

At the close of 1870, some 23 years after the founding of the Great Salt Lake Valley, there were or had existed 194 different United States Post Offices. At the arrival of statehood, January 4, 1896, there were or had been some 586 different towns receiving postal service in the Utah Territory.

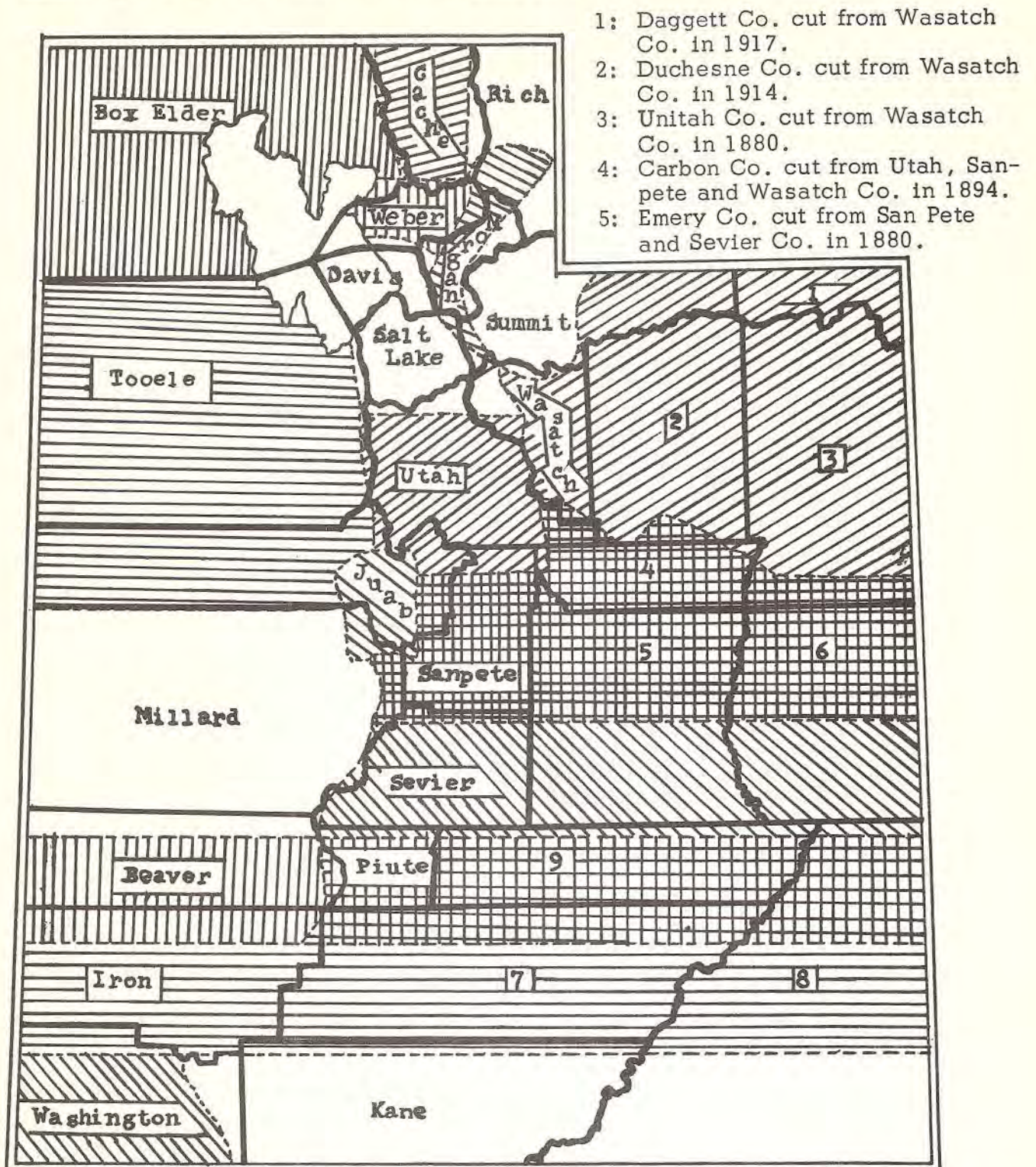
As a supplement hereto is a list of the 586 Utah Post Offices as taken from the Records of Postmaster Appointments and other publications and records. The list is probably not complete although considerable cross-referencing and checking has been done. Errors noted by readers, if communicated to the author or editor, will be corrected. Towns with the same names, where listed separately, and followed by a county name in parenthesis are totally different towns. A correction of boundary line transferred a number of northern Utah towns to Idaho in 1872 and 1873.

Editor's Notes: Besides the Utah towns that become part of Idaho, we also find those that became part of Nevada such as Carson City, U.T., Virginia City, U.T. and others. It must be kept in mind that most of Nevada was part of Utah Territory at one time.

We hope that the publication of these Western Territorial lists of postoffices in Western Express has been of help to the collectors of territorial covers. We will gladly continue to publish others as they become available to us.

For the Utah list we are grateful to our good member, Joseph Clary. He obtained it from our former member, Nyal W. Anderson, with permission to publish it. Our thanks to both of these nice gentlemen.

CONTENTS OF THE LETTER
By J. David Baker

Letter to Mrs. Hannah Slatford, Ann Arbor, Washtenaw County, State of Michigan

Weaver Creek, May 11, 1851

Dear Mother as I told you in my last I arrived in San Francisco April 10th but I wrote my letter on board and had not seen the city at the time of writing. I found it to be a large fine city and the most active business place I ever saw. the buildings good and the stores well filled with goods, and except some coarse goods for miners they were as fine and fashionable as in any of our eastern cities. the market was filled with provisions as abundantly and of as good a quality as any city in the land. The Tavern and Boarding Houses set as good a table as any one could wish to eat at. We have good meat here Beef Pork Veal Mutton Deer and Antelope plenty of fowl such as geese Ducks Quail and Cat. Fish are abundantly and of excellent quality we have the finest kind of Salmon and cheap They bring them into the mines and sell them to miners for 25 cts per pound, but in the cities they are not half that price. I found the (city) market to be well supplied with vegetables, potatoes onions green turnips fresh redishes. Lettuce all sorts of fruits and in short any thing that you would find in New Orleans. and by the way I thought that was the best market I had ever seen. Board in the city by the week is from 12 to 20 dollars. I paid 2 dollars for one days board, being the time that I staid in the city. I got in Thursday afternoon, and left next day at 4 o'clock a. m. on the Steamer New World for Sacramento City and arrived there the next morning.

I could not find the persons for whom I had letters in San Francisco. I therefore left them at the post office. I found Mr. John Pulhemus at Sacramento City he was well and was doing well. I left the letters that I brought for Ann Arbor folks with him his store being the Ann Arbor Post Office. Sacramento City is a very large place on the Sacramento River about 120 miles from San Francisco it has very good buildings mostly frame and is a very great business place. I left Fathers things with Mr. Pulhemus and left the city in the afternoon in company with Mr. Bergan and Thomas for the mines. we thought we would go to Georgetown about 60 miles from Sacramento in the Sierra Nevada Mts. We found the road very good for about thirty miles from the city. Being a beautiful level plain entirely destitute of bushes and covered with grass and flowers with a few low, large top oaks, making beautiful shade trees. We hired our baggage carried on a waggon that was going out at 6 cts per pound and we traveled on foot and went about 10 miles that day. the next morning we started early, the air was fresh the sky clear and the sun bright, the birds sung sweetly thier notes came from every tree. The vast plain spread out around us in every direction covered with flowers and spangled with shade trees whilst far in the distance were visible the eternal snows of the Sierra Nevada mountains. It was Sunday and I thought it was the loveliest morning that I had ever seen.

We travelled about 25 miles that day. The next morning we got up early and came to this Creek before breakfast, a distance of 7 miles. we took breakfast at the tavern, and hearing that Harvey Cornwell was living and mining on the creek about a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile down, we set out to find him. we found him in his cabin and he was glad to see us. we made inquiries of him in regard to mining prospects. we learned that the water was to high in the mountains and on the large streams for miners to work. There was a chance for us to work here So we concluded to halt for the present. Cornwell was working in partnership with a man by the name of Sanford thier Diggings lay on the creek about a mile below thier cabin. we went down to the digging with them and tried the dirt in a pan what is called prospecting. we panned out a pan or to a piece out of Cornwells hole and got from 5 to 10 cents to the pan. we staid with them at thier work till noon then went up with them and took dinner. After dinner we went to a store in the neighborhood and bought a set of mining tools consisting of a cradle second hand which we got for 7 dollars a pick new $4\frac{1}{2}$ dollars we got a pan and dipper into the bargain with our cradle. Shovels we brought from Sacramento They range in price from 2 to 8 dollars we also bought cooking tools consisting of a baker or bake kettle camp kettle coffe boiler tin pan to mix our bread in and a tin plate, tin cup, knife fork and spoon and then we was set up and ready for operation.

we staid with Cornwell the first night and took supper and breakfast with him. next day we bought some flour and pork ten and sugar and boarded our selves. We found a deserted tent near our digins and used it to eat in and to keep our baggage in. We got the loan of a small tent of Mr. Cornwells six feet square and pitched it to sleep in. we was hed a little dirt to try our cradle and spent the rest of the day in fixing our tent. we spread some old blankets on the ground that we found in the old tent and they formed our bed we udes our new blanket to cover us with I have a first rate pair of heavy blue blankets which I bout in Sacramento for four dollars and fifty cents. The first night that we spent in our tent it rained all night and was rather unpleasant. I made the bread I raised or rather heavied it with flour and water that had been mixed up to sour and sallaratin I made rather a bad job of it. but we had good appetites and it went down well. It rained the most of the next day and considerable of time during the first week, in which time we made but 2 Dollars and 75 cts apiece a sum which fell a little short of paying for our grub as it is termed in the mines. we found the tent rather uncomfortable. it was damp and cold night.

Cornwell and Sanford wanted to hire a man and ofered 75 Dollars a month and board. I thought that I could do better to work at that rate and accordingly hired out to them, and commenced working for them the next Monday. mining required some experience. The Creek on which we are at work is in the region where the gold was first discovered, about 8 miles from Coloma and is one of the first Creeks that was

worked in California. This County is called Eldorado and Coloma is the County Seat. It has about as many buildings in it as the lower town in Ann Arbor and is a verry active place. I was out there last week and saw the old mill in the race of which the gold was first found. They are active in diging around it yet. this Creek on which we are is called Weaver, the banks of it has been tamed upside down the whole length of it. It has paid well, perhaps has been one of the best paying streams in California, but its best days are past, but there are hundreds working on it within 2 miles of us. some are leaving it and some are coming to it every day it rains in the Sierra Nevada Mts and empties into the American River. we are about 4 miles from its mouth. Occasionally a man strikes a hole where he makes 40 or 50 dollars a day but such strikes are scarce. but a man might make 2 or 3 dollars a day on it almost anywhere. some of the dirt will pay to wash over. Perhaps about 3 dollars a day is the average of what the miners is making on this creek. I have talked with many of them that has been in the country for a year or two and has traveled about among the mines considerabley and they say that Weaver Creek pays as well as any diggins that they have been as a general thing. A man is sure of something here, is he is well and works.

I saw Mr. Goodale the week before last. he (came) down here to see Harvey. he left Mud Springs about a month before I came here and in company with Hossler went into the mountains about 250 miles from here but they found the snow deep and the water tq(o) high un the rivers fro mining. they spent all thier money and then went to work on a small creek called Weaver, not the same that we are on. Mr. Godale staid with us two days and then left and Mr. Cornwell went with him. I had been working for him and his partner 8½ days. I settled up with him and received 25 dollars for my work. He then proposed to sell out to me his share in his partnership stock with Sanford and for me to go into partnership with Sanford which I agreed to and paid him 25 dollars for his share with consisted of one half of a tent cooking and mining and next day went to work with my new partner. He is a Virginian. We moved from the cabin and pitched our tent on the side of a hill near our work about a mile and a half further down the creek. we are making now from three to five dollars a day apiece we work our dirt in a machine called a long Tom. It is a machine about 12 feet long and about 20 inches wide with side pieces about 5 inches deep the bottom and sides are made of boards it turns up at the lower end. The runners of a sled on the bottom of the turnup parts is iron punched thickly with holes to let the gold through as the water washes the dirt down and to sift the stones out. Underneath the screen end of the machine is a box which catches the gold and fine gravel. We set the machine near the dirt bring the water from the creek by means of canvas pipes so that it ran through it then we dig the dirt and where it is not near enough to shovel in we carry it in pails and through it in. the water running over it washes it along to the screen, where one stands to stir it up with a shovel and to through away the stones and let the gold work into the box beneath. when we can get good dirt we can make good wages at it, but the most of the dirt that we have washed did not pay more 3 cents to the bucket. The groundis very stony and in some places very hard to get dirt so that we have made more by washing 3 cent dirt in some places than we could by washing 4 or 5 cent dirt in some other places. Sanford and me can wash from two hundred to 4 hundred buckets a day. the quality of dirt is reconed by the bucket or pan and ranges from a cent to 1 dollar to bucket or pan about the size of a common water pail. a man in dirt that is easy to come at will wash with a cradle about one hundred buckets. Perhaps the average quality of dirt is about 3 cents on this creek but it is doubtful weather it will be that another season. I think that all the dirt (that) is worth working on this creek will (be) worked out this season and not on this creek only, but in the mining country around here unless some new diggins are discovered.

This is the cheapest part of the mining region to live in. Provisions are comparatively cheap and easy to get. There are stores about every mile along the creek and in two or three in a mile in some places wherever there is a chance to get in with a wagon there is a store or two. the creek runs through a verry but the hills rises up hundreds of feet on both sides and in some places you can hardly scramble up, but where ever it is possible for a waggen to get in there is stores. This is a verry rough begin about here hilly and rocky. The price of provisions about here are as follows: flour in sacks brought from Chilly and of excellent quality from 50 to 100 pounds in a sack at 11 dollars per 100 pounds. Pork salt 20 cents per pound fresh beef 25 cents bacon and smoked hams 25 per poind Salt fish 25 cents per pound potatoes 15 cents per pound onions 75 cents per pound beans 25 cents per pound tea from 1 dollar to 2 dollars per pound coffee from 30 to 40 cents per pound butter from 50 to 60 cents per pound chese about the same as butter molases 2 dollar per gallon sugar 13 cents per pound liquor by the bottle 1 dollar by the drink 25 cents. Clothing as follows pantaloons from 2 to 7 dollars per pair boots from 2 to 7 dollars per pair flannel shirts 2 dollars, Blue shirts 1½ dollars. I bought a good pair of shoes at a store here for 2 dollars.

When I was in San Francisco clothing and boots and shoes was as cheap as in Ann Arbor. But San Francisco is nearly destroyed they have had a terrible fire there lately that has destroyed nearly all the business part of the citty above a thousand houses was destroyed and all the goods seven persons were burned to death. The loss is variously estimated at from 10 to 30 millions of dollars. I do not know how long I shall stay here. Goodale promised to write to me and if he writes encouraging I may take it into my head to go there. Goodale and Hossler done well there when they got there they had spent all thier money but in a month they made they cleaned about 2 hundred dollars apiece. All that I have seen from Ann Arbor is Mr. Pulhemus Mr Cornwell and Mr. Goodale. I long to hear from home. I want to know how you all are. I have felt bad on account of Fathers death. My health is good but I have lost my apetite and found a hogs. William and John can see how I am getting along from this letter. I intend to write to them after I have had a little more esperience in mining and have seen a little more of the country. I often think about you all at home although I am well contented here. My love to all mother sisters and brothers. Write immediately give my love to all my friends. I remain your affectionate son. John Slatford

Mr. Bergan and Thomas are well and working in the neighborhood. I have written badly I had to sit on the ground and write on my knee. Please let me know wether you got the papers that I sent from San Francisco if you did not I have more that I can send. I shall send the money as soon as I can make enough but I shall have to go to Sacramento to do it and I cant leave here at preasent. Write to Sacramento Citty Californi.

I intend to send home what money father left one hundred and five dollars and enough to pay my part of the money loan and interest.

NOTE: All of this was written in a Gregory's Express Pocket Letter Book which contains an 1851 calendar on the inside of the back cover. The book contains 24 pages which can be written on both sides. When John Slatford finished all the pages he turned the book 90 degrees and started writing across pages already written on.

The cover is a stampless "40" from Sacramento City Cal May 14, 1851.

SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Second General Assembly of the Western Cover Society was held on Saturday, September 12th, at Los Angeles, California in conjunction with the 73rd Annual Convention of the American Philatelic Society, of which we are a unit. President Jessup called the meeting to order at 2:00 P.M. after luncheon and refreshments. There were forty members present from all sections of the country, including such illustrious gentlemen as Charles C. Cratsenberg, President of the American Philatelic Society and David Lidman, Editor of The American Philatelist.

President Jessup inquired if there was any formal business to come before the meeting. Being none, he then proceeded to act as toastmaster in his usual genial manner, calling on many of those present for words of cheer or ideas for the betterment of Western Cover Society. Through this informal exchange of words came several constructive ideas for the future. The Oregon delegation reminded us that the next Annual Convention of the American Philatelic Society would be held in Portland, Oregon next year, at which time and place the Third Assembly of the Western Cover Society would also be expected. All of those present concurred and it was so ordered. The meeting adjourned at 4:00 P.M.

ADDENDA AND CORRIGENDA

The "Addenda and Corrigenda" section of the July issue of Western Express was of great interest to me, especially the part referring to Wells Fargo Agencies in Nevada.

While attending the Western Cover exhibit in the California Historical Society Building last Fall, I made notes on all (to me) unusual Wells Fargo & Co. covers on display. In checking these notes, I find two items which may be of interest.

1. RUBY CITY is not shown on the list in April W.E., although both Ruby Valley and Ruby Hill are listed. There was a RUBY CITY N.T. on display in the above mentioned exhibit. According to my notes, it was a clear strike on a 3¢ 1864 U59 envelope. Possibly W.F. used that name for a short time. Langley's Directory of 1866 lists "RUBY, Lander Co." so possibly it was another case of Ione City, Ione Valley, etc. In any case it would seem that RUBY CITY is a new name for the list.
2. The 19th name in the list in April W.E. is shown as CREANANE. A cover with this marking was also shown in the exhibit but I decided that the first letter was, in reality, an "O". Apparently the letters in the handstamp had been "jammed up", causing the first letter of the abbreviated State name to follow the Agency name without any spacing. Also, the final letter of the State abbreviation had been omitted or broken off.

It is my belief that the name which appeared as C R E A N A N E should be translated as O R E A N A / N E (V)
If this supposition is correct, then the 19th Agency in the April listing should be deleted, as OREANA is shown in the Supplementary listing in July W.E.

Sorry to bother you with such things but I think there would not be so much pleasure in research if we could complete everything once and for all!
